We often speak proudly of our Wesleyan heritage, and rightly so. At one time, nearly every town and city In America had a Methodist church located on a major crossroad that ministered to their community. Only God knows how many souls have been saved in those great numbers of Methodist churches. However, Methodists also have a rich history and heritage of being divided Methodists (see timeline pg. 3). It is sad, but true. Where two or more gather in Jesus' name, at times there can be disagreement. Looking back in history, we will find that the areas of disagreement typically center upon theology, social concerns, and church doctrine. Who is God, and what does the Bible say about Him? What does society say? What does the church say? How does the church bring those three diversities together in harmony?

Since the birth of the Methodist Episcopal Church at the Christmas Conference held in Baltimore Maryland in 1784, conflict has caused division at least a dozen times. The first major split among Methodists was due to slavery, an issue that had also effectively divided America. In 1844 it would divide the Methodist church. Some Methodists, including a well-known bishop from Georgia that had inherited slaves, did not believe that owning slaves was a sin. That went contrary to the official position of the Methodist church established at the Christmas Conference sixty years earlier that clearly stated "we (Methodists) view it (slavery) as contrary to the Golden Law of God." Fearing a loss of revenue and offending some members, the General Conference eventually voted to split the church in two, those who identified with slavery, and those who didn't.

Spanish philosopher George Santayana once said, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." Sadly, that is true for the Methodist church. In fact, the people called Methodists are in the process of splitting once again. This time the question is not about the sin of slavery but the authority of the Bible, about who and what it reveals about Jesus, sin, and salvation. Are the Scriptures inspired and infallible? Was Jesus conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of a Virgin in the town of Bethlehem? Did Jesus die on the cross to make sinners righteous? Did Jesus rise from the dead in bodily form on the first Easter Sunday? Is Jesus the Son of God, is faith in Him the only way to heaven, and will He return again in glory to judge the living and the dead? What is sin and who is a sinner? What role does the church have in making those truths known?

It is not our opinions on those matters that will make a difference in the end, but whether we acknowledge and uphold the Scriptures that reveal them to be true. One thing is for certain and that is the Bible answers those first five questions in the affirmative. It also clearly reveals what sin is, how people can overcome it and the role of the church in our journey of faith. If we can't agree on those long held orthodox Christian beliefs, affirmed, and taught by followers of Jesus for more than two thousand years, we will likely not agree on anything of eternal significance. In fact, the UM Church can't even agree on how to disagree. It is becoming apparent that the equity that is prized by so many in the denomination has been carefully swept under the rugs of secrecy, delay, and mammon.

This latest conflict will affect the Millcreek Community Church in many ways. Out of pastoral love for you, I have prayerfully chosen not to leave the denomination at this point in time as some other UM pastors have done. My rationale is that as of now, the Book of Discipline for the UM Church has not changed, although key provisions are being blatantly ignored by some pastors and bishops. It is inevitable that the unofficial and readily apparent unorthodox UM positions on social issues such as abortion, marriage and human sexuality will soon be codified in such a monumental way that the revised Book of Discipline will be found to be in direct conflict with long established Scriptural (and Wesleyan) principles. I trust you will agree with me that unfaithfulness to the Word of God constitutes an irreconcilable difference.

It will be wise and prudent for us as a church to explore the various options that will become available to us, as many other churches have done throughout Methodist history. At this time, it appears there will be three. We can maintain the status quo, disaffiliate with the UM Church and join another Wesleyan denomination (i.e., the new Global Methodist Church), or disaffiliate with the UM Church and remain independent.

Our leadership team is charged with the responsibility of considering the implications of those options in the months to come. We will share them with you once we have adequate information that will allow us as a church to make an informed decision, one that will be pleasing to God. The leadership team meets on the 2nd Tuesday of the month at 5:30 PM. It is an open meeting, and your presence and your peaceful voices are welcome. I would ask you to pray for myself, our lay leaders Diane Redfern and Steve Easter and for the entire leadership team here at Millcreek as we move forward in discerning God's will for our church. 

Thanks be to God who helped all of us to make improvements to His House.


