

No matter where Jesus traveled during the short time He spent on this earth, a crowd or in Biblical terms a "multitude" would soon gather around Him. The crowds that greeted Jesus on the first Palm Sunday were made up of two groups of people - a multitude of disciples, who were shouting Hosanna, which means savior, and a

multitude of others who were doing everything in their power to get them to stop. Some two thousand years later, the battle rages on. Even so, multitudes are still attracted to Him today, even though His body rose from the dead and departed from this earth more than 2000 years ago.

Some would say the primary reason so many people were and are attracted to Jesus is because of illness and a need to be healed. That may be true, for the Scriptures record numerous examples of that very thing. But not every person who follows Jesus is sick or in need of healing. Some followed Him out of hunger. One of the largest crowds that Jesus encountered was the estimated 20,000 people He fed with 5 loaves and 2 fish. Still others in the crowds are there out of curiosity, wondering if the unbelievable things they had heard about this man named Jesus could be true. Could a tax collector, a harlot, a thief, a pimp, a drug dealer, or a murderer really be forgiven and given a chance to start over with a clean slate? What about those who didn't have the right last name or lived on the wrong side of town and would be afraid to enter the church for fear of being tossed out? Could people like that really have the chance to know God as well as those who came to church since they were 8 days old? Could this Jesus really be different than all of the other gods and religions they had heard about?

The question for each of us to ponder is not why the multitudes were drawn to Jesus, but why we are being drawn to Him. Certainly, there is no need too great for Him to meet. Healing? Hunger? Curiosity? A chance to start over? Jesus helps us with all of those things and offers us something much greater. Jesus is offering to meet the greatest basic need each of us have- to know that God loves us and will provide a safe and secure place for us to dwell on the other side of death, a place where there will be no hunger or pain or unanswered questions.

As you read this, be assured that a huge crowd will always be gathered at the feet of Jesus. The good news is that there is plenty of room for anyone else who wants to join Him. Jesus invites everyone to repent of their sin and join that crowd. Not just any crowd, but the great army of those singing Hosanna, Jesus Saves, Glory to God in the highest. On Easter Sunday, we will see exactly how our personal invitation to join them was made possible. In the meantime, ignore those who seek to ruin our parade and challenge our faith. Pray for our church and our country. Shout Hosanna, for if we don't even the stones will cry out (Luke 19:40). If you listen closely, you might even hear their voices in the distance.... Pastor Greg
