

I hope it stops snowing. I hope the Steelers win. I hope I get a good report from the doctor. I hope to see you soon. More than anything, we need to experience hope. That little four-letter word is one of the most powerful yet misunderstood words in the English language. It is an action, a positive feeling that motivates us to get out of bed in the morning and face the day. Hope can also be something physical, like a person or thing in which we place our trust. It can be something abstract- a feeling of security or excitement about the future. Where does hope come from? Is it something in the air, like the common cold or a computer virus where we catch it from someone else and spread it around to others? Do we conjure it up by reading Dr Norman Vincent Peale's book "The Power of Positive Thinking"? It is tempting to think so, but the problem is that kind of hope quickly vanishes when things don't work out as we expect or as quickly as we expect. Human hope is a false hope that often brings disappointment and despair.

In Romans 15:4 the apostle Paul speaks of a different kind of hope, one that comes from the "patience and comfort of the Scriptures". It is not something we receive on our own, as 15:13 reveals that it comes by the power of the Holy Spirit. It is not an uncertain hope like hoping our team will win a ball game but a holy hope- the confidence in knowing that God wins over evil. In his book Mere Christianity CS Lewis describes this kind of hope as "a continual look-ing forward to the eternal world". It is a holy hope, knowing that God loves His people-including you and me- and that He has a plan for our lives and a place reserved for us in eternity.

That kind of hope is a prevalent theme of the Scriptures. The word hope is found 130 times in 121 verses and the message the writers consistently convey to us is this- where there is holy hope, there is joy. Paul goes on to remind us in Romans 8:24 that we are saved by hope, and without hope the people perish. There is an old hymn that reminds us of that! *My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness. I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly trust in Jesus' Name.* That kind of hope cannot disappoint us.

With human hope there will be despair, but when we place our hope and trust in God and the cross of Jesus, despair turns to joy. Let us seek holy hope this Advent season and beyond, individually and corporately as the body of Christ. Let us set ourselves aside and glorify Father, Son and Holy Spirit and share our hope, our living hope, Jesus Christ, with others. Stay hopeful! Pastor Greg


